
President's Message



Cleveland School Remembers

Taking Action to Reduce Gun Violence

The Haggin Museum and Cleveland School Remembers, a Brady Campaign Chapter, are presenting a Panel on Art Activism and a workshop on Saturday, November 5th from 2-4pm in the Haggin Museum classroom. There is no charge, but space is limited. Seating will be on a first come, first served basis.

The panel features local art activists Denny Ah-Tye, Cathie McClelland, Ernest Tomasi, and Sylwia Qualls discussing their personal experiences and understandings of art activism: why and how each became involved in art as an activist, and how all of us can be involved in promoting causes we are passionate about through visual art. Those attending are encouraged to comment and ask questions.

The panel will be followed by a workshop where participants design posters seeking local artists to create art on the theme "Our Anguish, Our Resolve" for an Art Against Violence exhibit in March 2017. At the workshop, a variety of free materials will be available, as well as stickers that include basic information about the "Our Anguish, Our Resolve" exhibit so that all may focus on artistic elements and effective presentation in making their posters, rather than on the exhibit detail information.



Equal Pay LawsStrongest in the Nation

Last year the California Legislature passed a strong equal pay bill. On September 30th Governor Brown signed into law two additional equal pay bills, making California's law the strongest equal pay law in the United States. "SB1063, The Wage Equality Act of 2016, is the first of its kind in the nation and will explicitly prohibit employers from paying lower wages to minority employees compared with white employees when performing 'substantially similar' work."

This bill's language is the same as last year's Fair Pay Act, which put the responsibility on the employers to prove the pay difference is deserved if there is one. Pay differences are still allowed based on merit, education and seniority.

California minority employees suffer from great wage differences. Asian Women make 90 cents on the dollar; African American women make 64 cents, and Hispanic women make 54 cents for every dollar Caucasian men earn. African American men earn 75% less than Caucasian men.

The other act signed into law in September, was AB1676. This law puts strong limits on employers being able to use an individual's previous salary as a basis for their new salary. "The reality is that women face consequences of the pay gap from their first paycheck until their last social security check." These three Equal Pay Laws in the state of California will help women fight wage discrimination.
