The meeting is on Saturday, March 10th, at Central United Methodist Church in the large room. See all of you wonderful women there.





Dangerous Education Rollbacks

During the State of the Union Speech President Trump said that his administration has rolled back the most restrictions in the history of the United States. No remarks were made as to which restrictions had been removed.

I consulted E-newsletters from the Leadership Conference on Civil and Human Rights. I found that 72 regulations in these areas have been targeted since the beginning of this administration. These did not include what has been rolled back in other areas of the government such as environmental protection, interior and public lands, health and welfare, energy, agriculture, etc. Some news reports have claimed that more than 800 regulations have been targeted for removal and about half of these removals have been accomplished. The goal is to benefit big business, coal, oil and gas with these rollbacks. Low priority or none at all are given to negative effects on public health and the environment.

Here are a few of the regulations that have been rolled back in the Department of Education. Some of these regulations restricted doing things and some clarified how to do something.

<u>On March 27</u>- Trump repealed the Education Department's accountability rule that clarified states' obligations under the Every Student Succeeds Act.

<u>On June 6</u> – Secretary of Ed. DeVos testified before the Senate appropriation subcommittee and made unclear statements about whether she would allow federal funds to go to schools that discriminated against LGBTQ students. She made similarly troubling statements when testifying before a House committee in late March.

<u>On June 6</u> – Dept. of Ed. Office of Civil Rights (OCR) issued unclear new instructions on transgender student discrimination.

<u>February 16, 2018</u> - The Department announced that it will no longer investigate transgender student bathroom complaints and will not support an education free from sexual discrimination (AAUW Update, Feb. 16, 2018).

<u>On August 1</u> – Justice Dept. of Civil Rights will investigate and sue Universities over affirmative action admission policies deem to discriminate against white people.

<u>On September 22</u> – Dept. of Ed. will rescind guidance related to Title IX and schools' obligations regarding sexual violence and educational opportunities. The dept. removed the "clarification letter" about how to handle sexual abuse cases thereby weakening the support for the abused student and favoring support for the accused. <u>On October 2</u> – DeVos rescinded 72 guidance documents outlining the rights of students with disabilities.

<u>On October 27</u> – Dept. Ed announced that it was withdrawing nearly 600 policy documents regarding K-12 education and higher education.

Also of concern are the appointment of unqualified personnel to leadership positions in the Department the Education. Betsy DeVos has no education experience as demonstrated during her confirmation hearings. She previously was a lobbyist for private schools. She belongs to and supports an organization whose mission it is to get rid of the constraints of Title IX. The title is one of our strongest supports for equal opportunities in education and sport for both women and men. She also advocated privatizing education. Trump's new budget allocates funds to support her goal. She successfully converted much of public education into private education in Michigan. The result was declining state support for public education and the removal of Michigan schools from among the top 12 in the U.S. to the lower quarter of schools in the U.S.

Candice Jackson, DeVos's new Head of the Education Department's Office for Civil Rights, told the *New York Times* that 90% of campus sexual assaults fall into the category that "we were both drunk". She made this "flippant" remark while planning a meeting for Betsy DeVos with an advocated group. She later apologized. It sounded like 90% of the complaints were false. This is "not true statistically" according to a study published in the *Journal Violence Against Women*. False allegations are in the 2% to 10% range.

Currently nominated to be the assistant to head of the Dept. of Ed. Civil Rights Office is Kenneth Marcus. His name has been presented to the committee for a hearing on his nomination. 200 civil rights organizations have opposed his nomination because of past hostilities on civil rights decisions and anti-free speech regulations. They feel his appointment would threaten fundamental rights at our campuses. He is also anti-affirmative action and does not support cases of minority students and has fabricated evidence against students. He lobbied Congress to defund Middle Eastern Studies programs that were not supportive of Israeli policies.



<u>Madonnas of Leningrad</u> - Bit by bit, the ravages of age are eroding Marina's grip on the everyday. An elderly Russian woman now living in America, she cannot hold on to fresh memories—the details of her grown children's lives, the approaching wedding of her grandchild—yet her distant past is miraculously preserved in her mind's eye.

Vivid images of her youth in war-torn Leningrad arise unbidden, carrying her back to the terrible fall of 1941, when she was a tour guide at the Hermitage Museum and the German army's approach signaled the beginning of what would be a long, torturous siege on the city. As the people braved starvation, bitter cold, and a relentless German onslaught, Marina joined other staff members in removing the museum's priceless masterpieces for safekeeping, leaving the frames hanging empty on the walls to symbolize the artworks' eventual return. As the Luftwaffe's bombs pounded the proud, stricken city, Marina built a personal Hermitage in her mind—a refuge that would stay buried deep within her, until she needed it once more.
