What's next for Title IX?

Saturday, October 21st, 2017 Central United Methodist Church

Title IX prohibits sex discrimination in any educational program or activity receiving any type of federal financial aid. In addition to sports, Title IX also addresses the areas of equality in access to career education, STEM classes, sexual harassment protection, standardized testing, technology, and other areas. Signed into law by Richard Nixon in 1972, Title IX has faced repeated attempts to amend or repeal.

This year marks the 45th anniversary of the passage of Title IX. What is the status of this law today, and what does the future hold? Our October meeting will feature Andrea Goldblum, Title IX coordinator at UOP, who will discuss with us the past, present, and future of this important legislation.

Our meeting will be on October 21st, in the Fireside Room at Central United Methodist Church. We will begin with a breakfast from Noah's and a brief business meeting, followed by our program. Please join us.





A Gentleman in Moscow - In 1922, the Emergency Committee of the People's Commissariat For Internal Affairs sentences Count Alexander Ilyich Rostov to spend the rest of his life inside the Hotel Metropol for writing the poem "Where Is It Now?" which brashly asked the question, "where is our purpose now?" In imposing the sentence, the prosecutor pronounced that the Count "has succumbed irrevocably to the corruptions of his class - and now poses a threat to the very ideals he once espoused. On that basis, our inclination would be to have you taken from this chamber and put against the wall." Instead, the Count is sentenced to a lifetime in the Hotel Metropol, where he has previously resided in luxurious accommodations. Of course, when he is returned to the Hotel, he is removed from his luxurious accommodations and moved to a single attic room.

CEDAW is a "Bill of Rights for Women." endorsing CEDAW the City of Stockton confirms its credibility as a city leader in human rights. CEDAW is a tool that women are using to fight effects of discrimination: violence against women, poverty, lack of legal status in inheritance and property rights, and access to credit. The San Joaquin County Commission on the Status of Women is seeking endorsement of CEDAW by the Stockton City Council. Gander Equity and women's human rights are an intrinsic part of comprehensive human rights. We will be asking the Stockton City Council to ratify CEDAW. Please try to attend the meeting. Your presence is invaluable.

The San Joaquin County Commission on the Status of Women is seeking governmental recognition for the only Commission on the Status of Women in California that does not have such a governmental designation. believe the time has come for such recognition. We have waited 43 years.

As our membership has grown, so has our ability to improve the quality of life for our mothers, sisters The Commission works to and daughters. ensure equality of rights and opportunities for all women in the county. We empower women and provide a unified voice for women's issues. And we continue to seek and encourage dynamic women and girls who are interested in making a difference in our community.
