



Equally exciting, 27 AAUW Stockton branch members participated in the Stockton Women's Collaborative Black History Program. Our members were seated in groups of three per table throughout the room so that we could mingle with women from other associations to share our branch stories and mission. The program was rich in content and messages. It was an important time to commemorate the countless contributions African- Americans have made in our communities, while often enduring racial injustice and discrimination. Keynote speaker & Stockton first lady Anna Nti-Asare Tubbs urged all women to speak up, to tell our own narratives and the stories of unsung heroines. We can no longer let our voices be silenced! AAUW's research shows that women of color often experience intersecting and compounding forms of race and gender discrimination.

I had an opportunity to watch a movie called "The Hate U Give". The movie is based on Angie Thomas's award-winning book about a black teen who witnesses the fatal police shooting of a close friend. The movie deals frankly and powerfully with race and racism. It also speaks of differences between teens growing up in predominantly African-American neighborhoods and those from affluent white neighborhoods. If you would like to have a peek of this poignant realistic fiction, I highly recommend the book and movie.

For every issue we tackle, be it paycheck fairness, sexual harassment, or racism, we cannot fully advance equity as a nation unless we seriously address all the intersecting forms of discrimination.

March is Women's History Month. Let's recognize this month, every month the women in our lives and in our community for their efforts, passion, sacrifices, and contributions. Keep their stories alive!

### March is Women's History Month\*

Women's History Month is an annual declared month that is dedicated to honoring contributions of women to events in history and contemporary society. It is celebrated in the United States, the United Kingdom, and Australia and corresponds with International Women's Day. The United States can trace the celebration's history back to 1911 when the first International History Day celebration was held.

The first Women's History Month's event was held in Sonoma, California on March 8, 1978. The Smithsonian Institution, The Women's Action Alliance and Sarah Lawrence College sponsored it. These participants felt it was so successful that they supported an effort to secure a National Women's History Week. In 1980 President Jimmy Carter issued a presidential proclamation declaring the week of

March 8<sup>th</sup>, 1980 as National Women's History Week.

From the beginning of Europeans settling in America, women have been instrumental, but their contributions have often been unrecognized. "It an essential and is indispensable heritage from which we draw pride, comfort, courage and long-range visions," proclaiming Carter said in the observation. part of the observation, As communities are encouraged to focus on observances that honor leaders who struggled for equality -Susan B. Anthony, Sojourner Truth, Lucy Stone, Lucretia Mott, Harriet Tubman and Alice Paul.

Carter felt that "Understanding the true history of our country will help us comprehend the need for full equality under the law for all people." He encouraged ratification of the 27<sup>th</sup> Amendment to the Constitution. The amendment states: "Equality of Rights under the Law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of sex.' Described as the Equal Rights Amendment, it still has not been rarified, being three states short of ratification.

In 1987 Congress designated the month of March as Women's History Month. The following year an additional resolution authorized the president to proclaim March of each year as Women's History Month and encouraged local celebrations.

In March 2011 the Obama administration released a report, *Women in America: Indicators of Social and Economic Well-Being*, showing women's status in the U. S. and how it has changed over time. This was the first comprehensive federal report on the status of women since one published by the Commission on the Status of Women in 1963

Note: the movement to sign the Equal Rights Amendment remains active. Recently Nevada and Illinois have signed. One more state is needed to ratify the Amendment. It is hoped that Virginia will be that state. Most of the Virginia legislature supports ratification. It is being held up by the conservative members of the legislature.
